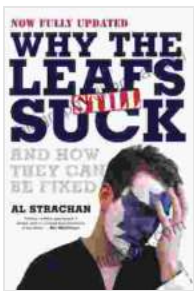


The 7 Common Problems of the Nigerian Education System And How They Can Be Fixed

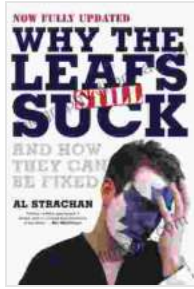
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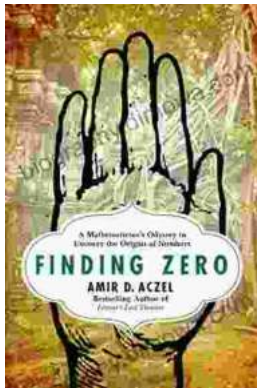
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
