I made a cast, and the lure went flying through the air. But I didn't hold on to the rod tight enough. The rod slipped out of my hand, and it went flying into the ocean.


I was so embarrassed. I had to dive into the water to retrieve the rod, and I almost drowned. But I got the rod back, and I was able to continue fishing.

Just be sure to hold on to your rod!



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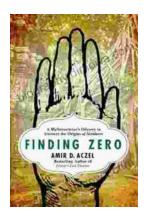
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
